## Why IICD?

Since 1997, IICD has been helping to create practical and sustainable solutions that connect people and enable them to benefit from ICT. As well as having insufficient access to education and healthcare, our local partners in Africa and Latin America may often lack access to public services, technical innovations and even electricity. ICT can be a powerful economic, social and political tool when placed in their hands. It can help them to access, process and disseminate information quickly, effectively and on an unprecedented scale.

### Some examples of how ICT is helping people

- ICTs can seriously enhance the entire education process. Most crucially though, it improves teaching materials; allows the creation of locally produced materials for teachers and students; and improves basic computer skills which can improve future career prospects.
- ICTs can be used to implement better health management systems and improve access to treatment. It can reduce the distance between rural doctors and patients but also doctors in remote areas and the medical specialists found in larger urban areas.





- Small-scale farmers and entrepreneurs in remote areas lack information on market prices and conditions. Increased access to information gives them a stronger bargaining position, enabling them to do business more freely and improve their production methods.

## **Get involved**

### **Tailor-made programmes**

Tailor-made programmes look to both the needs of your company and the needs of our partners. We offer programmes focussing on a certain theme or country - like access to education or health care. Specific projects or programmes are identified for which targeted activities are organised to engage your staff. This includes a visit to the project under the guidance of IICD staff.

### **Product sponsorship**

You can support IICD and local partners by offering hardware or support the maintenance of technical equipment. Many of our local partners face difficulties in the purchase and maintenance of hardware and software. Product sponsorship directly tackles this.

### **Donation**

You can give a donation to IICD or even a specific project. The money is spent directly on a number of key areas: training of local project partners; the purchase of ICT equipment; or research and development (R&D) activities regarding affordable, innovative solutions.

We have worked with a number of established and widely respected Dutch and international private sector companies and organisations, including Atos Origin, Cap Gemini, Inter Access, Ordina, Manobi and TNO. To give you an idea of how we have been working together, here are some examples:

- The Johan Kooij Fellowship Foundation of Dutch telecom company KPN supports the Global Teenager Project, a project connecting over 8,000 pupils from 32 countries in Africa, the Caribbean, Europe, Latin America and the Middle East.
- The French Dutch IT company Altran offers consultancy to various local partners in Zambia and Tanzania.
- Together with the European Space Agency and the Dutch research institute TNO, IICD works to develop a model for affordable satellite solutions.
- The Belgium Close the Gap Foundation donates refurbished computers to local partners and, if needed, provides them with training on technical maintenance too.



## Facts & figures IICD

- IICD was established by the Dutch Ministry of Foreign Affairs in 1996, and is located in The Hague, The Netherlands.
- We currently work in Bolivia, Burkina Faso, Ecuador, Ghana, Jamaica, Mali, Uganda, Tanzania and Zambia.
- Programmes and activities focus on the education, health, governance and agricultural livelihoods sectors - with a cross-cutting focus on the environment, women and rural telecentres networks.
- IICD has supported more than 130 projects in Africa and Latin America, of which many are now continuing independently.
- The projects have thus far reached an approximate total of 750,000 direct end-users and 6.5 million beneficiaries, the majority of whom live in rural areas.
- 10 national ICT networks have been set up which support and coordinate knowledge sharing, advocacy and lobbying activities.
- IICD has its own Monitoring & Evaluation system to measure the impact of its work. So far, 18,000 questionnaires have been collected from end users and beneficiaries, the analyses of which have been published in various learning reports.
- Our core funders include national and international governments, development organisations based in The Netherlands, as well as the private sector.
- IICD holds the ISO 9001:2000 Quality Certification and has been identified by the Dutch tax authorities as an official charity (ANBI).
