Preface

The Action Plans presented in this publication detail the projected numbers of children that Aflatoun's implementing and associate partners believe they can reach by 2010 and 2011, and the major steps in how they plan to go about in achieving these results.

The Action Plans will be separated by the Regions in which Aflatoun works. Within each region, we introduce first the Implementing Partners and follow with Actions Plans of Associate Partners.

Overviews about our Implementing partners were prepared by the Secretariat and reviewed by our partner organizations. They provide a quick overview of the innovative, context-specific implementation that has taken place in each country where the programme is running live in schools.

The action plans were executed by partners during and subsequent to their attendance at the 2008 and 2009 Aflatoun regional meetings in the Philippines (Asia region), Peru and El Salvador (Latin American region), Kenya and South Africa (Africa region), Jordan (MENA region), and The Netherlands (Europe region).

In a few cases, the Secretariat has worked subsequently with partners to clarify or adjust numbers and data assumptions, but, in essence the data sheets appear as submitted by the Aflatoun partner network.

These numbers go beyond the centrally projected figure of 1 million children used in Aflatoun's Strategic Plan. They demonstrate the creativity and originality of our implementing partners in working together with each other and get the programme to children in a meaningful way.

The numbers used to project the following charts per area were collated from partner actions plans received by the 23rd of June, 2009.

On behalf of the Aflatoun network, we would like to thank everyone who has been involved in supporting both the regional meetings and the compilation of the subsequent plans and numbers which are presented here.

Introduction

Welcome to Partners for Change, edition 2009 – the global showcase of Aflatoun Partnerships in support of Aflatoun's vision of economically and socially empowered children breaking their intergenerational cycles of poverty.

Compiled before the Launch of the global Aflatoun Campaign (2008 – 2010), Partners for Change 2008 consisted of two parts:

• An overview of the self-reported action plans of Aflatoun's implementing and preparing partner organizations

• The Campaign Commitments by the key stakeholders in the Aflatoun

Partners for Change 2009 has been compiled right in the middle of the Campaign and shifts the focus entirely towards the core of the Campaign: the Aflatoun Programmes. In this publication, we present:


Partners for Change demonstrates two key elements of Aflatoun's approach to programme implementation and policy reform:

1. Cross-sector, egalitarian partnership is a powerful means to bring social practice to a global scale

Aflatoun works with a wide range of organizations from different disciplines and countries to bring the Aflatoun programme to a projected 3.1 million children by the end of 2010. In the pages to follow, it is shown how the Aflatoun Programme is brought to children worldwide by governmental and bilateral organizations, international and national non-governmental organizations (INGOs and NGOs), international and national microfinance institutions, university institutions, foundations, cooperatives and other financial institutions.

Their focus ranges from primarily financial to distinctly rights-based, from formal to non-formal education, and from working with young juveniles to the children of mothers in savings groups. These partner organizations work together on an equal basis within the Aflatoun Network to establish quality programmes, striving for a great outreach over children around the world. Also within countries partners work together across sectors for impact and scale.

2. Stimulating innovation by putting trust in our partners Aflatoun believes in bottom-up, grassroots innovation and creativity. The Secretariat believes that our partner organizations, the people on the ground who develop, run and experience programmes in the field, are best equipped to make the Aflatoun programme work in their own context. Aflatoun therefore stimulates programme and concept innovation by our partner organizations, whilst safeguarding a global core to all programmes. The results of this trust-based innovation can be seen in the different ways in which the programme is being implemented in the different countries globally.





Action Plans – Global Summary

The chart below shows the totalled action plans from partner organisations received by the end of June 2009 (2009 Action Plans, columns 6-8), and the totalled action plans received before the Campaign Launch at the outset of 2008 (2008 Action Plans, columns 3-5). By 2010, all partners together aim to reach 3.1 million children, and 5.7 million at the end of 2011. These numbers can be compared against the latest actual data from the partner survey, done in the second quarter of 2009 and presented in Children & Change 2009 (column 2). partner organizations at the beginning of 2008. If this trend continues throughout the next year and a half, the overall global target of 1 million children should be within reach.

Training

Aflatoun's training tree forms the basis of the scaleup model, and it is promoted by Aflatoun as the most realistic, low-cost and replicable route to scale-up. As our training strategy evolves, it is hoped that the entire network will receive support to serve everyone's needs.

Outreach

The total number of children throughout all programmes is planned to almost double every year. The most important driver for this strong growth will be witnessed in the Asia region. As can be seen in the individual action plans, the way in which these numbers are built up throughout the individual country programmes differs substantially. With the rich variety of partner organizations (e.g.

governmental bodies, local NGOs, INGOs, MFIs), there is much variation in the way in which these numbers are achieved.

In Partners for Change 2008, 58 action plans were submitted by Aflatoun partners in 44 countries. This 2009 edition, 68 action plans have been submitted from a total of 53 countries. As the network grows, and as our partners share experiences, models for implementation and scale-up strategies at international and regional meetings, the projected numbers become more achievable each year.

With 10 new programmes starting their pilot in schools throughout 2008, the total number of Aflatoun students by the end of 2008 was a reported 484 thousand students, an impressive 82% of the target set by our



Strategic partnerships

In 2009, Aflatoun and UNICEF announced their global strategic partnership to support children's social and financial empowerment worldwide. UNICEF and Aflatoun are working together to incorporate the Aflatoun curriculum and approach into UNICEF's "Child-Friendly Schools," a programme for quality rights-based education. We hope that this burgeoning partnership will continue to benefit the quality and expansion of the network.









Action Plans – Sub-Saharan Africa

For Sub-Saharan Africa, action plans were received by 19 partner organisations in 17 countries. The chart below totals the plans across formal and non-formal education sectors to reach nearly 500 thousand children by 2011. We are looking into the possibility of integrating Aflatoun into programmes that deal with Orphans and Vulnerable Children (OVC) in a number of countries. Intervention in the non formal education sector is also what we are aspiring to explore more with our partners in Africa.

Collaborations

Our partners are working in collaboration with Community-Based Organisations and other local institutions in order to make sure that the programme acquires the necessary buy in from and owned by the community.

Training

We are looking at creating a regional and sub-regional pool of trainers that could assist in the scale up of the programme in each specific sub region. In order to realize this goal several Sub regional trainings had been conducted and we are preparing for more in the coming months.



Strategic partnerships

We are creating strong partnerships with PLAN International and Christian Children's Fund to implement the programme in different countries. This will likely help in facilitating lessons from country to country through organizational sharing.

Conclusion

Given the current global economic situation which has led to a decline in funding for the social sector, several partners have been forced to scale down their projections. In addition, the reduction of target projections reflect the effort that partners and Secretariat have dedicated to developing accurate programme implementation plans, which has also led to a more realistic understanding of programming numbers.



Kenya Global ICS



Start of programme: 2008 Age range: 7 to 15 years old Grade levels: 1 to 8 No. of schools: 12 Rural public schools Area: Busia and Tesso Districts of Western Kenya Looking forward: To expand the programme to 12 other schools in the same districts. Involve different stakeholders as it will help in scaling up the programme nationally.



We operate worldwide to realize a safe and enabling environment, so that all children, regardless of nationality, religion, colour, gender or political creed can realize their rights. Girls, boys and their direct environment are able to act as responsible members of society, who enjoy education, good health and protection.

Material Adaptation

We are liaising with our Tanzanian Partner, TCP-Maryland Helper, for grades 1-3 materials to be translated to Swahili. We are exploring the possibility of localizing the Aflatoun programme to country specific context and decide on the end product for effective learning through the participation of other stakeholders. We are looking into developing additional Aflatoun theme specific products like posters and stickers.

Training

The first training for teachers was conducted in 2008. We have trained 24 teachers from 12 schools and 2 Educational Quality Control Officers from the two District Educational Departments. We are also planning to create a link with our Ugandan Partner, PEDN, to train 6 trainers from cluster schools and 5 ICS Staff members as trainers. These trainers will then train 28 teachers within their cluster. Through this approach we are confident to build a strong hub of trainers and teachers that can take on Aflatoun in schools in the 2 new districts and beyond.

Stakeholders

We work in close collaboration with Tesso and Busia District Educational Bureaus and the administration of the schools we are working with. Currently we are in the process of forming partnership with different stakeholders at the national level. The ground was already laid for this network in November 2008 through an initial stakeholders meeting which was attended by participants from different organizations and the Ministry of Education.

Review & Reflection

Even though it has only been a few months since the programme went live in schools, we are receiving positive reports.Aflatoun activities are creating a strong bond between pupils and teachers due to its participatory method for teaching. Children are empowered after realizing their rights and through this knowledge they are also sensitizing their parents and the community.

Productive Enterprises

These are organized and carried out by the students in order to generate collective savings. These enterprises have produced Postcards for different events, as well as rope and brooms. Currently most savings are done collectively and are kept in schools.

Aflatoun Events

Children are organizing different Aflatoun events. These events include participation in World Children's day and World AIDS day where they present their songs and poems for the audience. These events help bring children together to share their experiences. Children with support from school administration created Aflatoun walls and notice boards that display Aflatoun messages.

Challenges

The main challenge we have faced is with the variation of the level of commitment and performance from the different schools. The transfer of teachers and district education officials to other districts is also creating a gap in the implementation of Aflatoun.

Mali CAMIDE, GAP



Start of programme: 2007 Age range: 9 to 13 years old Grade levels: 4 to 6 No. of schools: 8 Area: Kayes region Looking forward: Mali is in the process of finalizing the French books and is scaling to 4 regions in 2009.



Aflatoun in Mali is a joint partnership between CAMIDE and GAP, two Malian organizations. CAMIDE is a microfinance institution with a network of 55 village banks in the Kayes region. The banks are entirely managed by the village, and their structure is highly participatory at the village and regional level. CAMIDE's experience is complemented by GAP, the Programme Support Group. GAP is a group of development workers with an interest in social services, especially in education.

Material Adaptation

Material development and adaptation was a lengthy process. The French translation is almost complete and the books have been contextualized by the organizations, a teacher's committee and trainers to fit the context of Mali. The French books will be used by other Francophone countries in the region.

Training

The organizations held a training of teachers to introduce the Aflatoun concept. The teachers were provided with background information about microfinance and the savings process with the village banks. The materials were not available in French in time for the first training of teachers which made training difficult. A series of trainings will be organized by CAMIDE & GAP in 2009, using the French books. The local education advisors were trained on the programme with the teachers and they have been of great help in monitoring the programme schools in their areas.

Stakeholders

Mali had its first stakeholders meeting in 2006 to create awareness about Aflatoun amongst the communities in the villages and in the schools. The organizations took time to sensitize all the villages where the programme is implemented as dealing with money is a very sensitive issue for the people. The first meeting included children, parents, teachers, local government, local education offices and village bank leaders. The children who participated in the meeting prepared the first illustration of Mamadou and Binetta (Moussa & Nèma) for the Aflatoun books. Meetings with local education advisors, local organizations, and international organizations followed in 2007 & 2008.

Review & Reflection

Engaging the community and parents in a transparent saving process proved very important to gain their support. This also strengthened the programme and the children's participation in saving. The close proximity of the village banks to the schools also proved very useful in order to have a successful saving programme that was easily accessible.

Productive Enterprises

The first stakeholder meeting produced 9 ideas from children about how to generate income. Initially, the community worried that children would be discriminated against if they could not save. This was resolved by the mothers of the children,by giving them examples of how they could save (i.e. children usually pick wild fruits and sell them).

Aflatoun Events

There were no regional events scheduled in 2008 due to the lack of funds. CAMIDE is planning a regional children's event in June 2009.

Challenges

The lack of French materials represented a challenge to the growth of programme and the inclusion of the social components of the programme. The children are more comfortable with their local languages than with French, which is the language of instruction in the school system. There is a need to encourage teachers to use local languages while implementing the Aflatoun programme.

Plan International is a humanitarian and child centred international NGO promoting communitybased development. The Aflatoun pilot programme in Mozambique is a partnership between Plan International and Wona Sanana.

Wona Sanana is a Mozambican NGO that builds capacities of communities to understand children's needs and take actions to improve children's quality of life.

Material Adaptation

Some lessons from books 3-6 were translated to Portuguese and adapted for the teachers to start in school immediately after their training. However, there is a strong demand from the teachers for well-sequenced and illustrated lessons. To address this need, a second phase of translation and contextualization is planned but has been delayed

Training

The first training of trainers was co-facilitated by Wona Sanana and the Aflatoun Secretariat in July 2008. 16 teachers were trained as trainers. The second training was conducted in August by the trained teachers who felt empowered to pass on the concepts to their colleagues. Each of the 9 pilot schools now has at least 4 teachers and administrators trained. In each school the school director was also trained in order to guarantee the continuity of the programme, as teacher transfers are very common.

Stakeholders

An official from the District Directorate of Education was trained on the Aflatoun Programme. In addition the directorate staff participated in the supervision of the the programme in the schools. The Aflatoun programme will be presented to the Provincial Directorate of Education early in 2009. Wona Sanana & PLAN are planning to produce regular reports on program activities for the district, provincial, and national educational authorities in 2009.

Review & Reflection

The Aflatoun programme generated considerable support among the teachers, who felt that responsible saving and spending were important skills for children to learn. Many children became interested in the Aflatoun activities through the t-shirt-making project, while the parents developed a positive view of the program when they saw their children involved in community based activities. The team will strengthen this positive image of the program in the next school year, as they support the teachers to systematically explore with students the issues of child rights and responsibilities, community development, personal behavior, and other.

Productive Enterprises

Children in the Aflatoun club decided to make straw mats using local materials to raise funds for their club activities.

Aflatoun Events

Children aged 8 to 13 years in 9 primary schools in the Jangamo district of the Inhambane province in Mozambique have started learning about saving and spending, contributing to the community life, as well as about their rights and responsibilities. Children participated in a clean up around their communities therefore creating a positive image of the programme. In addition all the Aflatoun clubs enjoyed making their own Aflatoun club t-shirts. Older students, with the help of teachers and NGO staff worked with the younger students to make their t-shirts.

Challenges

The contextualization and translation of the Aflatoun materials took longer than expected due to technical problems. This has delayed the delivery of full book sets to the teachers.

"[At the Aflatoun Club], I learned to save various things, such as water, money, food, school uniform... The games that I learned in the club I taught to my friends in the neighborhood."

We are a not-for-profit organization whose mission is to empower youth by teaching them how they can impact the world around them, focusing on the key areas of entrepreneurship, work related life skills, and financial literacy.

In Namibia, we are currently the only organization delivering the programme and are doing so in the capital, Windhoek. In the coming year we are hoping to bring the programme to five additional regions.

Material Adaptation

We used the materials that were provided to us by the Aflatoun Secretariat, notably the savings books. We are going to be creating workbooks that we feel are appropriate for the Namibian context.

Training

We held a three day training workshop with teachers from 25 schools in Windhoek. This training covered the basic principles of Aflatoun, along with the core elements of the programme. Teachers were then responsible for going back to their respective schools and teacher there colleagues about Aflatoun. A follow up training was held in 2009 with the Aflatoun Secretariat for both teachers and trainers.

Stakeholders

The programme has the active support of both the Ministry of Education and Standard Bank in Namibia. Standard Bank has both provided accounts for children and an outreach worker who collects money from children on a regular basis. The Ministry of Education in Windhoek was a key implementing partner as they were able to guarantee us the participation of the schools in Windhoek. Also, they provided entry into the curriculum through the life skills work already being done in schools.

Review & Reflection

A review of the programme showed that teachers have been very quick to take up the saving component of Aflatoun. There has been less work to date on social education. This will require us to increase the amount of material that we provide in this area as well as provide follow up training. Another key learning was that both monitoring and better selection of teachers is required to ensure that the programme is replicated well in individual schools.

Productive Enterprises

These are organized and carried out by the students in order to generate collective savings. At one school, different products made of paper (like bookmarks and drawings) were sold within the school to collect money for the club.

Aflatoun Events

We are looking into the possibility of having events for our Aflatoun children.

Challenges

We are looking at a rapid expansion to new regions. As a new programme, we also have to make sure that our current work is effective. For this reason, we are working on improving our training and monitoring methods and



increasing the amount of material that we provide to schools as they begin the programme.

Established in 2000 with the aim of fostering empowerment and socially responsible citizenship among Nigerian children and youth who account for more than 43 % of the total population of the country. Our programme covers all zones in Nigeria.

Material adaptation

We are in the process of contextualizing the Aflatoun workbooks to a Nigerian context. We have finalized workbooks 1-4 and are currently working on the remaining ones, which will soon be completed. During this process of contextualization we conducted curriculum team meetings in order to consult with specialists in the area. In these meetings we received input to emphasize on areas of cultural differences and on the delivery pattern of the curriculum in different parts of the country.

Training

In the pilot period of the programme we conducted two training of trainer sessions and trained 80 teachers in the target 55 schools. Volunteers were also part of the programme and received training on the Aflatoun programme concept and implementation. In the scaleup phase of the programme, which started in early 2009, we managed to train 18 volunteer trainers who in turn trained 252 teachers in the 126 schools. In these training processes LYNX adopted Aflatoun's Training Tree Model to suit our own setting and applied it accordingly.

Stakeholders

Our first consultative meeting with stakeholders took place in 2006. These meetings were attended by members of civil society, including organizations that work with children and on human rights as well as representatives from the Ministry of Education, Ministry of Youth, Sports and Social Development and other relevant Ministries. We are currently working with various stakeholders in order to reach more children and improve the delivery process of the programme. We are also in dialogue with UNICEF-Nigeria to look into possible ways of cooperation.

Review & Reflection

LYNX and the Aflatoun Secretariat have made a huge effort towards improving the life of the rural child. We are observing diverse changes in the awareness level of the children, parents and the general community towards child rights and saving processes. Nigerian parents and teachers have been enthusiastic about Aflatoun and have encouraged their children to save and to be involved in all activities. Parents are learning that if they respect and preserve the rights of their children and assist them to learn the art of saving, they will be more supportive for them and become good citizens in the future.

Aflatoun Events

Children produced art works and engaged in collective activities that could generate money. Some of their ventures are basket making, bird cage manufacturing and guitar carvings all with the Aflatoun idea and concept in mind. Art work is also part of the Aflatoun activities where children make an Aflatoun table mat from Cardboard paper and Teddy dog from hard paper, recycled cloths and cotton wool. Through a community service project named "Kids Care for the Environment" children received 2,000 trees from the State Ministry of Environment. They were planted in the school compounds and in the neighboring community as part of an effort to fight desertification caused by the ever expanding Sahara desert.

Challenges

Expectations from volunteers and teachers for financial rewards for their involvement in the project has been a big challenge throughout the programme. A delay in full implementation of the project was witnessed at the initial stage due to the delay in the final approval of the curriculum by government authorities.

ACT exists to equip learners (grades 3-12) with important skills needed for life. With a strong focus on every one as a change maker, ACT infuses high levels of innovation in 5 exciting projects. Our projects vary from Child Savings, Peer Education HIV/Aids, Environmental Education to Career Guidance and Creative Study Techniques.

Material adaptation

We are planning to contextualize the African Workbooks for Aflatoun to the South African Context and translate them to Afrikaans and Xhosa languages. While contextualizing we will be using the illustrations that are in the workbooks for Africa. As part of this process we are preparing to hold a contextualization meeting. In this meeting members from the Ministry of Education and various NGOs will participate.

Training

One staff Member of our organization attended Aflatoun's regional Training of Master Trainers in Namibia. After the training this master trainer will be responsible for providing further trainings in South Africa and other countries in the region.

Stakeholders

We were working in close collaboration with schools, province educational bureaus and banks to implement Aflatoun. As part of our preparation for the scale up of the programme in 2009, we are working hard to form partnerships in the different provinces of South Africa. As part of this effort we, in collaboration with Nelson Mandela Children's Fund (NMCF) and the Aflatoun Secretariat, are preparing to organize an Orientation and Stakeholders meeting from 25-27 May, 2009.

Review & Reflection

Aflatoun as a model in study has opened doors as children discovered the possibilities when starting to save and getting to know their rights. A significant number of children started to visualize life beyond school and started planning for short and medium term goals that they set in their life. As teachers are applying the Aflatoun teaching aid, they notice more enthusiasm and excitement amongst children as the curriculum is based on experiential learning. Whilst some teachers thought it would have been extra work, others are in line to apply the model in their respective learning areas. A spirit of competition between schools is visible, especially when it comes to entrepreneurial ventures

Productive Enterprises


Cake and candy days are conducted by the Aflatouns themselves, whilst the local bank assists with an entrepreneurial and innovative day of "Town Building". This is a project where children apply raw material to "build" an institution they have identified as lacking within their immediate community.

Aflatoun Events

Children, with some assistance from our organization, are organizing different events. As part of these Aflatoun events in 2009 we are planning to have Entrepreneurship day and Sports day. Other activities might be added depending on children's feedback. We plan town building events once per quarter, as well as an art exchange venture whereby Aflatouns will exchange lifestyles in rural areas with those living in urban areas.

Challenges

Some challenges we are facing are: positioning the model in the best learning area within the educational syllabus; contextualization of training material; printing books for all teachers and a few for learners; finding a new savings partner and ultimately recruiting a financial partner/donor.

Aflatoun Programme

Maryland Helper is a name of place in Moshi perurban area, on the lowlands of Mt. Kilimanjaro in northern Tanzania. **HELPER** stands as abbreviation for **H**ealth, Education, Light Projects, Enhancement and **R**ehabilitation. The second meaning is giving a hand of assistance. Launched in 2005, Maryland Helper aims at improving life values of vulnerable and non vulnerable members of the society. Main areas of millennial liberations area are disease, ignorance and poverty.

Currently we are implementing the Aflatoun Programme around TPC and Mabigini on the lowlands of Mt. Kilimanjaro, on the north eastern parts of Tanzania. The programme is now live in 20 schools and is reaching more than 250 children.

Material adaptation

We have translated the Aflatoun Workbooks for standards 1-3 to our local language Kiswahili. This helps a lot as Kiswahili is the language of communication in the province and more specifically in these standards. We intend to share our translated workbooks with other Aflatoun partners in Kenya and the Democratic Republic of Congo. This way we hope to strengthen the link we have with partners that are implementing Aflatoun in the region.

Training

In October 2008 two staff members of our organization attended a ToT on Aflatoun programme implementation. The training was organized by the Aflatoun Secretariat and Private Education Development Network of Uganda. Those trained in turn trained 40 teachers that are selected from 20 formal schools. These teachers are now responsible in delivering the programme to the 250 children that the programme is targeting.

Stakeholders

We have been working with various stakeholders from the initial stage of the programme. Prior to the launch we have conducted a two days seminar with head teachers and their assistants in the 20 schools that the programme is operating. This helps us to get buy in from their side and get smooth access to schools and full cooperation thereafter. District education officials, community leaders and chair people of school boards were also involved both before and after the programme went live in schools back in February 2009.We are now working towards creating a strong link with more stakeholders from different fields that helps in expanding and strengthening the Aflatoun programme in Tanzania.

Review & Reflection

It has only been five months since the programme went live in schools. In this short time we are observing an increasing interest from children that are not members of the club and those from schools where Aflatoun is not being implemented in. This is because of the programmes uniqueness in the ways involves children and the learning by doing approach. Everyone in the community is interested in the programme and children are organizing events to sensitize the community on child rights issues.

Challenges

Translating Aflatoun Materials to Kiswahili took longer time than anticipated and delayed the distribution of books to teachers.

Aflatoun Programme

Private Education Development Network (PEDN) is a not-for-profit association of selected, highly professional individuals who promote entrepreneurship skills, business and financial education among children, youth and their educators in primary, secondary and tertiary institutions in Uganda.

Material adaptation

We now have a completely contextualized set of workbooks that reflect the local realities of children's lives.

Training

In October 2008 we organized a Three Day Teacher Training Workshop in Kampala. The training was hands-on with mock teaching sessions that emphasized child-centered learning. It also involved songs, drama and games to encourage child participation. As a result of this we were able to reinvigorate teachers. We also invited representatives of other organizations implementing Aflatoun in the region. One such invitee was TP in Tanzania who were able to go live in schools as a result of this training.

Stakeholders

From the outset, the Ministry of Education through the National Curriculum Development Centre has been an ally. Plan International, Post Bank, Innovations for Poverty Action, FINCA and Opportunity International Bank are amongst the stakeholders that have been attracted by PEDN's efforts at creating a movement of future change-makers within Uganda. They have shown this support by providing financial support, child friendly banking services and technical support. confidence, communication skills, problem-solving capabilities, leadership skills and discipline. Children can now cater for their own minor needs by buying their own books and pencils. Children are more responsible in their day-to-day affairs and in their management of money. They demonstrate greater knowledge of their rights and responsibilities. As a result of the children's activities, teachers and parents have become interested in personal savings and have opened up their own bank accounts. Teachers also opened up a savings association amongst pilot schools. A significant outcome has been that parents have found payment of school fees more manageable

Productive Enterprises

Children have been involved in a wide range of Income Generating Activities (IGAs) spanning from making beads, composite manure necklaces, charcoal stoves, mats, balls, seasonal cards, name tags, pottery, stuffed animals, plastic recycling, and agriculture. Through these school-based financial enterprises, children have been able to contribute to their savings, school fee payments and buying of educational materials.

Challenges

Strengthening the finances of the organization, so as to build a sustainable program.

Review & Reflection

A review of the program revealed that 75% of the 7142 students engaged with Aflatoun in 2008 were saving money, within a broader culture of saving resources such as water and soap. Aflatoun has contributed to the retention of children in schools by promoting childfriendly and fun learning. Parents and teachers report that participating children demonstrate increased self-

Outreach

There are currently 9 Aflatoun programmes being implemented in the Americas region, which means there is now a wide array of experiences from which to learn. The programmes focusing on formal education systems (in Argentina, Dominican Republic, Peru, Paraguay & Ecuador) are working mostly in public schools, although some of them include also private schools. Our partners have worked with different age groups, and have adapted their materials based on the Latinamerican & Caribbean version of the Aflatoun Books, which will also allow for improvement of the set in the next years. Partners have identified the need for expanding the age range to reach both children in pre-primary education -below 6 years old- and the rest of secondary education -over 14 years old. The programmes vary from urban to rural areas, with some programmes being mostly urban (Perú, Paraguay & Argentina) and others being strongly focused on working in rural & remote areas (Dominican Republic, Peru, Ecuador & Paraguay).

Educational Systems

In the non formal education area, we have two partners who are Microfinance Institutions who are going through innovative experiences: offering child social

Strategic partnerships

In the region, multiple partners implementing different programmes in one country are generally the norm, which is why elaborating a strategy to build country level networks is an important issue to be worked on in the region. The partner organizations from the region are also more strongly establishing coordination between themselves. By identifying common networks or partner institutions, collaboration between partner organizations from different countries is being initiated, not only within the region but also with Aflatoun partner organizations from other regions. Plan International and ChildFund (formerly CCF) are strategic partners in the region as there is increasingly more country offices from these International NGOs interested in implementing the programme.

Conclusion

Given the current global economic situation which has led to a decline in funding for the social sector, several partners have been forced to scale down their projections. In addition, the reduction of target projections reflect the intense work that partners and Secretariat have dedicated to developing accurate programme implementation plans, which has also led to a more realistic understanding of programming numbers.



Argentina Ejercicio Ciudadano

Aflatoun Programme

We are a non-profit organisation that seeks to strengthen democratic institutions in order to attain an interested, active and committed citizenship.

In Argentina, Aflatoun was originally implemented by Ecoclubes. Currently, Fundación Ejercicio Ciudadano is the organisation coordinating the Aflatoun Movement.

Material Adaptation

Our strategy was to develop one integrated child workbook to be used in different grades, as well as a teacher's manual. To best fit the national curriculum, the materials are now being improved by a team of Aflatoun teachers.

Training

The teacher training in previous years was done through meetings held in the schools and during teacher meetings held every other month. As a result of these meetings, a Teacher Network was formed. In 2009, a training of trainers will be carried out and afterwards, those trainers will train teachers. Although there is institutional support from the school, each teacher decides whether he/she wants to implement Aflatoun as part of their classes. Therefore, modules are delivered in different courses (ethics, ecology, citizenship, accounting, tutorship).

Stakeholders

The programme has been recognized by Parliament members and the Provincial Government of Santa Fe as being of educational importance. In 2009, we will be furthering the relationship with financial institutions such as Columbia Bank, as well as interested NGOs in other provinces, such as Fundación Gente Nueva.

Review & Reflection

A review of the programme revealed that in 20% of the schools attendance have increased the days in which Aflatoun classes are taught. Aflatoun has also encouraged child participation. For example: creation of a neighbourhood youth council to discuss local issues; an initiative creating awareness on teenage pregnancy; and activities carried out with children confined to a local hospital. The values that children identify mostly with Aflatoun are solidarity, camaraderie, respect, teamwork & investigative spirit.

Productive Enterprises

These are organized and carried out by the students in order to generate collective savings. These enterprises have produced bijouterie, Christmas ornaments and pasta. At the beginning, saving was only done on a collective basis through the productive enterprises. Now, around 60% of the children are also saving individually.

Aflatoun Events

We also organize different events to bring children together, such as the launch of the school year or culmination events. Children from different schools can share and learn from each other. Furthermore, to use creative learning methods, we have also developed an Aflatoun play & an Aflatoun board game, which emphasize the Aflatoun messages.

Challenges

Our challenge is to expand the programme to other grades and to the whole province; to strengthen the relationship with the Educational Department; and to consolidate the Aflatoun Movement in Argentina, by creating a network of organizations implementing Aflatoun in the different provinces of the country..

Plan International is a child centered organization aiming to achieve lasting improvements in the quality of life of deprived children in developing countries, through a process that unites people across cultures and adds meaning and value to their lives.

In San Juan de la Maguana, we work in alliance with the Regional Department of Education & Junior Achievement to implement the Aflatoun programme.

Material Adaptation

Plan Dominican Republic contributed to the contexualization of the Aflatoun Materials to the Latin American. Based on this work and the recommendations of teachers and children after the pilot phase, we have further adapted the materials.

Training

By end 2008, 150 teachers had been trained in the Aflatoun Programme by both Junior Achievement staff and the regional Department of Education.

Aflatoun Clubs

The Aflatoun sessions use the learning materials developed for the classroom. However, the children form their own Aflatoun Club, through which they can organize their own activities and the savings process. There are currently 104 Aflatoun clubs, usually one per class participating in the Aflatoun Programme

Savings


The average amount of savings per child is of 1 euro per month. Children keep their savings in collective piggy banks which are kept at school.

Aflatoun Events

The program is present in local expositions, educational events and community activities. The Aflatoun character, seen in the picture, teaches kids the importance of saving through drawing, playing and singing.

Challenges

Our challenge is to be able to find a financial institution interested in child friendly banking so that savings of the children can be secured. As well, we are working on developing a monitoring and evaluation system and increasing the number of hours per year dedicated to Aflatoun.

Child Fund International exists to help deprived, excluded and vulnerable children build the capacity to become young adults, parents and leaders who bring lasting and positive change in their communities. CCF promotes societies whose individuals and institutions participate in valuing, protecting and advancing the worth and rights of children.

The implementation of the Aflatoun Programme in Ecuador is part of ELICE, a project promoted by several NGOs as part of the new management model of the Ministry of Education. The Aflatoun pilot is one component of the project intervention.

Material Adaptation

CCF is using the Latin American versions of the Aflatoun workbooks for their pilot. The lesson learned from the pilot and feedback from teachers and children will allow further adaptation of material required for the scale up phase.

Training

CCF has provided teachers and parents a space for sharing about the programme to assure buy in from important stakeholders.

Aflatoun Clubs

The savings process has been added to already existing clubs formed by the children around issues as environment, theatre, literature, sports & other artistic expressions.

Savings

Each grade has a savings box. Each child is able to deposit and withdraw her/his savings from the collective box. Once a child has savings above 10 US dollars, she/he can open her/his own individual account in a local cooperative.

Challenges

The main challenge will be the expansion of the programme to other provinces and regions. Initial steps have been taken, such as coordination meetings with provincial education authorities where the programme was presented and discussed.



CDIA is the "Coordinating Network for the Rights of Children and Adolescents" in Paraguay, and as such is the coordination space for member organizations wishing to promote new alternatives for the integral development of children and adolescents.

VinculArte is a civil society organization that focuses on personal and community development, social and political influence and artistic expression, based on human rights. Its aim is to contribute to building a society that preserves and recreates its identity.

Work in Alliance

The Aflatoun programme is made possible through the alliance of CDIA, VinculArte, Plan International Paraguay & Financiera El Comercio-FIELCO. Though VinculArte is the organization responsible for implementation itself, each organization contributes. The programme is being implemented in Plan Paraguay's area of influence with the support of their Program Unit and local facilitators. FIELCO, a microfinance institution, partner of Plan, provides financial contribution and the support to the saving processes children will develop. CDIA provides the support and lobbying as network promoting child rights issues, which both VinculArte and Plan.

Material Adaptation

VinculArte adapted the Aflatoun Latin American materials to the local context and to complement the national curriculum. Materials for teachers and materials for children have been developed and printed. The lessons learned from the pilot, as well as feedback from the Ministry of Education, will allow further improvement in the scale up phase.

Training

The teacher training was held in early April 2009. 130 teachers from 22 schools were trained, as well as specialists from the Ministry of Education and Head Teachers from the participating schools. The training focused on the five core elements as well as on the planning of programme delivery in the classroom.

Live in schools

The programme has gone live in 22 schools. After the training, monitoring visits to schools will help support teachers and follow up the experience children are going through. Moreover, the programme has also been allowed to participate in the "Learning Circles",

spaces which provide opportunities for additional training for teachers.

Relationship with the Ministry of Education

VinculArte, representing the alliance, has built the relationship with the regional office of the Ministry of Education and Culture (MEC). This has allowed institutional support of the government in the different activities related to the programme, such as training of teachers and monitoring schools.

Advocacy through Media

The programme has been presented and interviews held in different radio and TV programmes, both in local radio stations as in one national radio programme and one national TV show.

Challenges

Due to the agreement established with the Ministry of Education and Culture, the programme is reaching 50% more schools than originally planned. This means that the monitoring process must be adapted to make sure we are able to help all schools in the process of implementation.

Fundación Paraguaya (FP) is a non-profit civil association working in microfinance and education. They are a leading social enterprise that seeks to develop innovative solutions to poverty and unemployment and proactively disseminate them throughout the world.

Fundación Paraguaya's strategy for implementation of the Aflatoun programme is through their microfinance initiative and targets the children of the women participating in their Women Entrepreneurs Committee programme. Women see their interest invested straight into their children's education.

Material Adaptation

Fundación Paraguaya developed one cohesive workbook "manual" based on an Aflatoun compilation of books 1-8 to be used for all ages in a non-formal educational context.

Afltoun Clubs

The Aflatoun Clubs bring together around 20 children per club. The club, with members between ages 4-14, meet one or two times a week after school hours at public community spaces. They bring their piggy banks and do activities from the Aflatoun programme. The average child saving in two months G. 2000 (US\$ 0.40). In one case a little girl even took the book and lessons she learned to her teacher at school, where they started to do some Aflatoun activities in the class.

Challenges

There seems to be a high demand of the programme, which makes clubs larger. Also, the broader age range of participants has led to some challenges. Also, in an out of school context, finding sufficient time to address all Aflatoun topics has been difficult.

At that time we would like to offer the programme on Saturdays as well in order to accommodate the rural areas.



We are a microfinance institution that facilitates access to material and intangible resources with the objective of improving the development of the capacities of excluded women and their families, resulting in sustainable communities.

Material Adaptation

Using the Latin American versions of the Aflatoun materials as a guide, we have developed a sixmonth curriculum for non formal education settings. The curriculum covers the following four themes: personal development; savings and financial literacy; sustainability and the environment; and global citizenship. Within each section we have incorporated a practical application activity, such as a micro enterprise project or garbage clean-up.

Aflatoun Clubs

In May 2009, the Aflatoun clubs initiated their activities. The club members are children of women who are part of the village banks supported by Finca Peru. The Aflatoun clubs meet every week,during the time that their mothers meet in their village banks. In our classes from Tuesday to Friday we teach students from the urban areas of Ayacucho, and on Mondays we travel to the rural town of Huascahura to offer the classes to youth whose parents have meetings in their community. The facilitators of the Aflatoun clubs at FINCA-Peru are two Canadian volunteers who are both recent graduates from the International Development Studies Programme at the University of Guelph.

Productive Enterprises

Each club is working on an enterprise project. These projects essentially mimic the activity of their mothers; working together to produce enough product to export. The children have chosen to make Christmas cards to be sold in Canada at a university campus. The profit is all returned to the children, who, thereby, learn about loans and making quality products in a large quantity.

Other Activities

Aflatoun is an independent programme in the setting of a microfinance organization; it is separate from a school curriculum altogether. Activities that take place outside of the regular curriculum include an interview of a role model, a garbage pick up field trip, and an end of programme fiesta.

Review & Reflection

Aflatoun is a newly introduced programme in the Ayacucho region and is in its pilot stage. Therefore, it is premature to review and reflect on the programme. The programme facilitators, however, are interested in examining the contrast of experiences for children receiving the Aflatoun curriculum in a formal learning institution as opposed to the environment of an optional after school programme. The focus of the latter seeks to achieve the same learning goals in a voluntary and activity oriented environment.

Challenges

Our challenge is to be able to work around the limitations of sporadic attendance and working to accommodate the age range of students from age 6-13; at many different levels of literacy within the same programme.

Start of programme: 2008

Grade levels: Primarily 3 and 4 (in some cases grade 1, 2, 5 and 6).

Looking forward: Depends on decision to expand that ODAER takes—very high demand for programme from local stakeholders—very likely to expand programme into pre-school ages—have the capacity and network to contextualize curriculum even for older ages.



ODAER (Organización para el Desarrollo Ambiental y la Educación Regional) is a community organization who seeks to better the quality of life in the Amazon region of San Martin.

Material Adaptation

ODAER has developed, in detail, a curriculum that is contextualized to fit local needs. They have 6 books for primary school grades but these are primarily used as teacher manuals, not for individual child use.

Training

Teacher trainings happened throughout September and October 2008 across various school districts (See photos: http://www.odaer.org/galeria.html) ODAER had expected a low number of attendees but due to high demand, many teachers came to the training.

Stakeholders

Because ODAER's personnel are teachers, they have a great network with teacher associations and with the local Ministry of Education representatives. ODAER has managed to sign 6 MoUs with local UGELES for the Aflatoun programme's implementation in these districts.

Review & Reflection

Programme just started—too early to review effectively- but there is clear excitement from parents, students, teachers, and education officials. They are very happy with training concepts, activities, and enterprise activities. The life skills focus is very relevant to local needs. Many teachers are taking Aflatoun activity ideas on their own into pre-school settings.

Productive Enterprises

Teachers organize on average one enterprise activity a month with the children because there is a perfect space in the curriculum that allow for this. These monthly activities require seed capital of about $\in 0.8$ (3-4 soles) per child per activity, which they are asked to bring to school. Many schools also have ongoing enterprise activities such as school gardens, recycling projects and such. They share ideas and also generate funds for school or class-wide events and needs (like better gardening tools).

Aflatoun Events

Local schools have organized two events already in October 2008—one school in Yantalo, Moyobamba organized a public parade and cooking event for "El Dia del ahorro" – Savings Day. Another school in Rioja, organized a similar public parade for the Nutrition days.



Challenges

ODAER, being a small organization with limited

resources, is struggling to meet the high demand for the programme in the region. There is a need to define a strategy for scale up and find funds to do so.

The goal is for CSFE to be included in the Regional Curriculum by 2011 and to be taught in every school of the region.



Plan International is a child centered organization aiming to achieve lasting improvements in the quality of life of deprived children in developing countries, through a process that unites people across cultures and adds meaning and value to their lives.

In Piura-Perú, Plan works in alliance with the Regional Department of Education. They promote together a project called "Aprendiendo" which aims to improve the education in the region. As part of the recommendations drawn from the pilot stage of the project, they have included child social and financial education into the project, and as such it is called "El Emprendedor Piurano".

Material Adaptation

The Regional Department of Education wishes to include social and financial educational in Piura's regional curriculum. Therefore, a thorough process of local contextualization of the materials is taking place. Piura's Pedagogical Institute was in charge of the first round of local contextualization, which included focus group discussion carried out with children. After the pilot a second round of contextualzation will take place to incorporate feedback and recommendations from children, teachers and educational specialists involved in the programme.

Training

By end 2008, 48 teachers had been trained. For each school, one focal teacher is the contact person for the programme. These focal teachers become trainers of other teachers in the scale up stage.

Deparment of Education

The involvement of the Regional Department of Education (RdoE) is key to assure the sustainability of the programme. The Aprendiendo Project is actually led by them, with Plan International being the support organization. This has allowed for institutional support in every step of implementation. The programme has also been supported by the local education networks, grassroots networks promoting education in the communities.

Review & Reflection

A baseline study was conducted to identify the level of communicational, logic, social, financial and enterprising skills already present in children participating in the programme. Three surveys- for different age ranges- were administered. A baseline for teachers was also established, identifying existing skills on financial and social issues, in order to later identify changes or improvement in those specific skills.

Challenges

We hope to strengthen the savings component by establishing linkages with a financial institution, encouraging savings books and class ledgers, and promoting financial goals for savings. We have also identified the need of providing schools with materials on social and financial education for children older than 14 years old and under 6 years old.

We are a civil society organization. In Lima, we receive the support of AFP Integra, a pension fund part of the ING Group.

Material Adaptation

Based on the latinamerican version of the Aflatoun materials, we have produced books for both students and teachers of 7th & 8th grade.

Teachers and Parents

Other than the usual training of the teachers on the components of the programme, we considered necessary a special space for sharing and discussing the saving component of the programme. It helped discuss different models of saving and helped decrease teacher's anxiety about introducing savings in school. The programme was also discussed with parents, as the programme was presented during parents meetings in each school.

Aflatoun Clubs

Even though the Aflatoun sessions are developed in the classroom, the children form their own clubs in order to carry out activities such as saving and social entreprises. In 2008, 280 clubs were started and of them, 262 clubs worked with savings communities.

Events

We strongly encourage the school to carry out different Aflatoun events. The internal events are events carried out within the school and are usually related to sharing about child rights, savings, or other aspects of the programme with children from other grades. The external events are initiatives targeting the community through which the children share issues that are of their concern or through which they offer what they have produced in their micro-enterprise experience. In 2009, the clubs have launched their activities by organizing the election of their representatives.

Review & Reflection

At the end of 2008, focus group discussions were held with teachers and students to gather their perceptions on the programme and recommendations for improving the programme. These recommendations have helped re-define some aspects of the programme in 2009. We have also collected data using the surveys developed by the Aflatoun Secretariat.

Challenges

Strengthen the savings component by establishing linkages with a financial institution, encouraging savings books and class ledgers, and promoting financial goals for savings. As the programme targets the first two years of secondary education, we have been asked by the schools to expand the programme for the last three years of secondary education.

Outreach

There are 10 partner organizations implementing the Aflatoun programme in 6 countries in the South and Southeast Asian regions - Bangladesh, India, Nepal, Pakistan, Philippines and Thailand. This year, more partner organizations have joined the network as Associate Partners from the other Asian regions. The big outreach numbers projected in Asia are boosted by the potential outreach of the Meljol programme in India Contextualisation which is in its scale-up phase and which is already working with multiple organizations in the country.

Educational Systems

There is also a continuing effort to work with children outside of the formal school sector, both with learners in marginalized populations (e.g. street children, children in conflict with the law, children in homes) and implications in providing with children gathering in non-formal settings (e.g. micro-finance institutions) as more and more partners working with children in these backgrounds have come on board. There is now experience bringing the Aflatoun programme to juveniles in jail in Pakistan, and context will always be children in homes in Nepal.

Strategic Partnerships

As more countries have multiple organizations

implementing the programme, it becomes more essential to promote and systematize country level collaborations. Aflatoun partners learn not only to work with fellow Implementing and Associate partners, but to also jointly approach other stakeholders for the strategic scaling up of the programme.


The diversity of the Asia region means that there is much greater challenge in contextualizing into multiple languages and regional dialects, as well as contextualising to different ethnicities, religion and

social issues, to ensure programme success. This will also have training & twinning programmes between the different partners as language and cultural points of consideration in planning future activities.





Bangladesh BRAC

BRAC is a Non-government organization that began in Bangladesh in 1972. Our vision is of a just enlightened, healthy and democratic world free from hunger, poverty, environmental degradation and all forms of exploitation based on age, sex and ethnicity. BRAC's strategy is to start any intervention at small scale and develop before being expanded. For instance it started with 22 non- formal primary schools in 1985 and the numbers increased more than 30,000 within 1995. As Aflatoun is a new concept BRAC opted to pilot the programme in 31 schools. The programme will be gradually expanded after having the reflection from the pilot activities.

Material Adaptation

As we have long been developing curriculum for the schools that we run, we have translated the Aflatoun materials into Bengali and adapted them by comparing which lessons in the workbooks did not yet exist in our school curriculum. Hence, we have absorbed the materials into the schools where the Aflatoun programme was piloted. We have developed materials for Grades 3 & 4.

Training

For our pilot programme, we have trained 2 trainers, who in turn have trained 19 teachers. These teachers then brought the Aflatoun programme to the schools.

Training (in Secondary): First of all, we arranged two different orientation programs for the SMC (School Management Committee) members, headmasters, assistant head masters and mentoring teachers in selected 12 schools in two different districts. For our

pilot programme we have trained 12 head masters and the mentoring teachers of the respective schools as well as our three programme organizers (PO) who directly involved to implement the activities.

Aflatoun Events: In primary school, the children are saving money and other valuables in their respective boxes which have been provided by BRAC. In secondary school, the saving system is implemented by making saving book and folders. The students were also provided with savings boxes by BRAC.


Review & Reflection

Children save an average of 38BDT (0.40 EUR) monthly with 100% of the children saving. Most of the children's money was received from their parents, as an allowance. Withdrawals are also done usually for the purposes of family expenses.

We have realized that the programme would be more effective if inserted as a regular activity in class, and we will work towards that. Also, we learned that teachers need more time to be familiar and comfortable with the concepts.

India MelJol

Based in Maharashtra, we began as a field action project of the Department of Family & Child Welfare, Tata Institute of Social Sciences, Mumbai in December 1991. Since its inception, MELJOL has been focusing on fostering healthy attitudes among children, creating awareness of the different needs of children from different backgrounds, and building the spirit of confidence and entrepreneurship in order to create a civil society based on the spirit of coexistence and achievement.

Material Adaptation

As the "the birthplace of Aflatoun", we had developed the original set of Aflatoun books which was later contextualized into regional and country level versions. However, as we move towards the different states of India, we also adapt the workbooks and translate them into the appropriate language. Our books are now in Marathi, Hindi, Malyalam and Oriya.

Training

In our pilot phase of the programme in Maharashtra, we had partnered with the state's Ministry of Education. They deputed teachers from within the public school system to become our Aflatoun trainers. They also gave permission for the teachers to attend the trainings conducted for them. Now, as we scale up, we are the resource center providing training for other organizations in other states as they implement their own Aflatoun programmes in their respective areas.

Stakeholders

The Aflatoun pilot programme was supported by the Maharashtra Ministry of Education. We have also received support from the Reserve Bank and Citi Foundation to continue and scale the programme. Most essential for the momentum of the Aflatoun movement in India are the partnerships that we form with other local organizations, NGOs and INGOs as they take on the programme in the other states of India.

Review & Reflection

To date, we have conducted a sociological study and a longitudinal study with the support of external researchers. The sociological study found that the efficacy of the training, (where vocal doubts by teachers were addressed by knowledgeable facilitators) and the response of children to the saving process resulted in high take up rates of the Aflatoun programme and that saving was widespread and 70% of students self reported that they saved. The longitudinal study found that the children were able to save substantial amount of money at the end of the year and could use these savings for an activity of their choice.

Productive Enterprises

Most enterprises in our pilot programme had been social enterprises where children addressed a social problem. One club organized an anti-tobacco campaign by raising awareness in their community, collecting tobacco butts and ceremoniously burning them. Another club performed a play to encourage community members to seek medical care from health facilities and not from quack doctors. A club whose school had high teacher absenteeism organized a trip to the local education office to demand for education.

Aflatoun Events

Some schools have had Aflatoun cultural events where the local traditional dances were performed by the tribal children from the residential tribal schools of Maharashtra. An 'Aflatoun week' was also celebrated in some where children held mock banks and learned about other currencies, how to identify a real Rs 500/note from a fake note and discussed the banking activities, among others.

Challenges

We have begun scaling up by partnering with 3 other organizations. It is now also in (Rajagiri) Kerala, (Asha) Orissa, (Prayatn) Rajasthan & (YMWS) West Bengal. In scale up, it is just as essential to keep involving local banks, local communities and parents to ensure the sustainability and support for the programme. Ensuring the quality of adapted materials is also important and usually takes about 6 months. As more local partners are on board, we are also faced with our new role of becoming the resource center of Aflatoun India.

Child Workers in Nepal (CWIN) is a pioneer child rights organization in Nepal. We were established in 1987 by a group of university students as a movement, which brought a fresh approach to social work, defying the convention of charity and heralding new concepts of rights, empowerment and activism. We focus our activities on the issues of child rights, particularly girls' rights, child labour, trafficking, bonded labour, street children, child abuse and children in armed conflict. We have already organized child clubs through its Child Rights Forums. We also work with Child Care Homes where orphans stay.

Material Adaptation

With the children, we have developed savings books and ledgers for the child care homes. We have begun contextualization of the Aflatoun workbooks by integrating it into our programmes at the child homes. However, we have yet to fully contextualize all the learning materials of Aflatoun.

Training

We have trained 25 trainers who will reach the different social workers in the child care homes. There are 270 social workers involved in the child care homes.

Stakeholders

At the moment, we are coordinating with the child care homes in implementing the Aflatoun programme. We have already had existing partnerships with other NGOs and INGOs but have yet to use these partnerships in the context of Aflatoun.

Review & Reflection

The formation of child clubs and the practice of democratic processes of election & discussion are very relevant in the changing context of Nepal where democracy is being established. Anecdotal stories have showed how children are relating their Aflatoun experience to the bigger society. In terms of the savings, the children have started collecting five to ten rupees from each child in a weekly basis, and appreciate how the savings system has helped them learn about the practice of prudence.

Productive Enterprises

Child care homes have established Aflatoun clubs among the children staying there. All the activities have been done through this club. If problems arise within the home, the children solve these through discussions in the club where they sit together and seek solutions to the problem. They also decide on how to use their money, whether it is for a future study tour, to buy clothes or give support to someone.

Challenges

We have hopes to expand the programme beyond our child care homes and implement in formal schools. We seek partnerships with other organizations to secure resources in achieving this goal.



We also hope to move beyond grade 5 level to bring the programme to other grades.



Kapince Nepal is an NGO, founded in 1997, focused on Children and Women Empowerment, Civic Education, Human Rights and Social Justice, Media Mobilization, Peace Education and Conflict Transformation and Good Governance. We aim to strengthen social development process in equitable and sustainable way through the dissemination of information to the underprivileged, marginalized and deprived community for equitable and sustainable community development. We have been working with the grass-roots empowering them with information, communication and awareness towards equitable and sustainable community development. We work in the Western region of Nepal. We have begun a pre-pilot in 5 schools, in the grade 5 classes.

Training

Kapince Nepal organized Teachers Training on 10 December 2008. Teacher Training was conducted in residential basis. The training was for three days. The teacher training gave opportunity to familiar with Aflatoun vision as well as clear on the role and responsibility of teachers in implementing the programme.

Aflatoun Events

Aflatoun child clubs have been set up in pilot schools. We provided sessions to children on Child Rights, the convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC), savings and caring for the environment. Children have started saving in the groups and have regularly conducted meetings. In each child club there are 30 members. Child club members started doing awareness activities on their respective village.

Stakeholders

We have conducted an orientation workshop with various stakeholders in the community: school teachers & heads, local government officers, other NGOs, INGOs, as well as representatives from political parties. As other organizations are also interested in the programme, we are now working with several other NGOs in our area to work as Aflatoun Nepal Consortium.

Productive Enterprises

Aflatoun child club members have conducted awareness raising on the community sanitation. They promote the prevention of open toilet systems in the community. Most villagers who did not have a toilet in their homes were used to using the open fields. The children made a declaration and discouraged the use of the field for toilet purposes. Some villagers were encouraged to make makeshift toilets in their homes.

Challenges

After the pilot programme, we hope to expand to other areas and schools. As we partner with other organizations, we are dealing with the organizational challenges of working together as a network and determine. Another challenge we are facing is security. The country security situation is not so good even at the community level. Political parties and indigenous groups regularly announce strike and this makes it difficult to follow action plan.

Next Steps

We are doing coordination with different NGOs and are able to finalize with an NGO based in Kavre District to implement Aflatoun activities with schools supported by this NGO. They are currently supporting 19 schools and the teachers' salary.

Sahil is an NGO working against child sexual abuse. Our areas of expertise are: training, data collection, counselling, legal aid, material development, research and publications. We conducted our pilot Aflatoun programme with juveniles (children in conflict with the law) at the Adiala jail as we had been running programmes there for 3 years.

Material Adaptation

As we move towards providing the Aflatoun programme to drop in centers, we have developed a CD based interactive Aflatoun learning material. With this, children would be able to play games, sing songs and watch short video clips while learning about social & financial themes.

Training

As the programme is a small scale non-formal education programme, our programme officers serve as the learning facilitators and conduct the sessions with juveniles. The program is managed by a qualified psychologist and a trainer. The Aflatoun topics are selected by the Executive Director who has expertise in both curriculum development and training.

Stakeholders

With the growth of the Aflatoun programme, we are exploring the possibility of partnering with Bank Al –Habib to open savings accounts as they already have an existing programme of Young Savers accounts. Our strongest partnership is with White Rice Communications, an organization that developed our CD learning interactive.

Review & Reflection

Anecdotal observations have noted that major changes were seen in the reduction of the fights that juveniles have amongst themselves. Many were now attending prayers regularly and the barracks are now well maintained.

Productive enterprises

The innovation introduced in the Adiala Jail was the promotion of social savings, as there are no money transactions conducted in the jail. Participants had inputted that, aside from money, they could also save time, good deeds, their health, and save themselves from abuse and fights. Hence, the juveniles began their "social savings". Individual savings were doing good deeds, refraining from fights and offering prayers. Group savings were keeping their barracks clean and attending Aflatoun sessions.

Aflatoun Events

Aside from the conduct of social savings, it was decided by the participants that the Aflatoun sessions would also be a venue for the juveniles to discuss issues that they would like to take up with the Adiala jail authorities. They would also discuss ways to protect newcomers to the jail.

Challenges

Consistency in holding regular sessions is difficult as we are only allowed to visit the jail twice a week, with each visit being dedicated to 1 (out of 3) wards. Often sessions cannot be held due to the Juveniles' other engagements assigned to them by the jail authorities.

Society for Safe Environment & Welfare for Agrarians in Pakistan (SSEWA-Pak) is an NGO working for rural development in the Sindh province of Pakistan. Our mission is Mobilizing Communities for Holistic Empowerment in Sindh Pakistan and their main areas of focus are Education, Water & Sanitation, Agriculture, Saving and Credit and Emergency Relief. One of our programme areas is Integrated Education and Literacy Program, and this is where the Aflatoun programme lies, with our pre-existing child self-help clubs.

Material Adaptation

We are in the process of developing the workbooks. However, we have already produced Aflatoun audio songs materials for the Aflatoun programme, namely a cassette tape with 13 songs in the local language which we launched during our celebration of Independence Day.

Training

To date, we have 4 trainers in our organization who have trained about 100 teachers. They hold the Aflatoun programme in the 25 schools that are run by SSEWA-Pak self support.

Stakeholders

The community members are strong stakeholders as we established the village community schools in partnership with them to increase the capacity of communities and aware communities about the importance of education and social rights.

Review & Reflection

Our 40 Aflatoun clubs have saved about 71,848 PKR (630 EUR). Before Aflatoun, we already had an existing self-help club where children were able to save and take on loans for small businesses. The introduction of the Aflatoun club gave the group a stronger identity and strengthened discussions on personal values and social rights during their weekly meetings.

Productive Enterprises


An Aflatoun club had conducted kitchen gardening where vegetables were harvested. Small businesses of selling things have also been one of the enterprise activities.

Aflatoun Events

One Aflatoun club organized a study trip to Hyderabad to visit a museum and see the city. One Aflatoun club members went to Nagarparkat Desert in Mithi and utilized the amounts saved up as a group to cover for the expenses of the trip.

Challenges

At present SSEWA-Pak is running the Aflatoun self help club with a lot of volunteer help. We are continuously seeking resources for funding to support the Aflatoun program and expand the programme to make it more beneficial for children in the future.

Childhope Asia Philippines is a non-profit, non-political, and non-sectarian organization. We advocate for the cause of street children (specifically in Metro Manila) through our Street Education Program, which conducts alternative education sessions and psychosocial counseling among abandoned street children. We were interested in the Aflatoun Program because we observed that older street children needed a program that would help prepare them for independent living as they can no longer identify families or relatives to help them and are rarely admitted in temporary shelters.

Material Adaptation

With the help of NATCCO, Aflatoun's first partner in the Philippines, we modified the Aflatoun Program to focus more on personal accounting, budgeting, and actual savings since these older street children had already received alternative education on social development and protection. The curriculum thus, includes: Needs and Wants, Personal Accounting, Budgeting, How to Save and Job Motivation. The materials were also modified to respond to the realities of the street environment of the children. Brainstorming, roleplaying, focus group discussions, and structured games are the preferred methodologies. We conduct the Financial Education Program to complement the Alternative Learning System for Basic Education, which was developed for out-of-school children and youth by the Department of Education. Psychosocial counseling and other interventions are also conducted to address issues that may prevent the children from actively participating in the program.

Training

NATCCO provided the training to our Street Educators in providing the financial education component of the programme. University students also volunteered to take part in helping the street children learn about personal accounting and budgeting.

Stakeholders

In May 2007, Childhope received a financial grant from Citi Foundation and United Way International through the Philippine Business for Social Progress to implement a Financial Education Program among 40 street children. UNICEF Manila also supported the program by providing funds for an additional 50 street children. We are now part of a consortium of Aflatoun Philippines and, through this, are partnering with Philippine Postal Savings Bank to explore the possibility of opening accounts.

Review & Reflection

As of September 2008, the street children had saved 15830.25 PHP (237.14EUR) in the 11 different areas that they operate in.

Productive Enterprises

We plan to link the Aflatoun to a vocational programme so that they learn practical skills by which they can earn income from. Some options are: Cosmetology, Cell phone repair, Car washing and Reflexology. Most of our participants 1) have been regularly participating in Childhope's programs and services for at least two years, and 2) are not regular or heavy substance abusers.

Aflatoun Events

The sessions are conducted during the time of the children's availability (usually in the afternoon or early evening) and either in fast food outlets or on the streets in parking lots. Street Educators collect the savings of the street children and deposit it as a joint account in the bank.

Challenges

Our main challenges for now are the disturbances caused by "rescue operations" of local government units, working out a definite schedule of sessions, and in some cases, keeping children from substance abuse. When possible, we approach parents of children of street families for their support before engaging the children. Street children also find it difficult to save money as their incomes are quite small.

" Before, my habit was earn money spend - then save. Now, after learning from this programme, it is earn money - save - then spend" - Street child, 16 years old.

Aflatoun Programme

NATCCO is an umbrella organization of around 1,200 cooperatives across the Philippines. Most member cooperatives are involved in financial intermediation like micro-credit and micro-savings (some with their own "Kiddie Savers Club" for children). We saw Aflatoun as an opportunity to expand our activities for children, especially in the rural areas, to facilitate their learning not just on financial education, but on social education as well.

Material Adaptation

The local cooperatives have been using the original Aflatoun workbooks as a basis for their Aflatoun lessons in partner schools. However, NATCCO also developed more financial manuals in the local language (Filipino) which were also used by one of our partners, Childhope Asia-Philippines.

Training

The local cooperatives are required to assign 5 employees to undergo our Aflatoun training. They are the ones who train the teachers of schools, brief the children and local stakeholders of the concept, facilitate Aflatoun camps, participate in progress meetings and document the different activities, in close coordination with NATCCO.

Stakeholders

We partnered with the Department of Education (DepEd) and the Cooperative Development Authority (CDA) to officially incorporate the program in formal schools and local cooperatives. Memorandums of Understanding were signed between NATCCO, DepEd, CDA, the local co-operative partners in the community, and the schools whenever the Aflatoun program took off.

Review & Reflection

Children can now relate to the Aflatoun logo as their learning companion. From the Aflatoun lessons integrated in their schools' Character Education subject, the children gain a better understanding of their rights and responsibilities. Through the childfriendly savings activity in their classes, children learn and practice the value of savings. Children take pride in having their own savings passbook.

Productive Enterprises

The schools incorporate the Aflatoun session in the weekly values education class. For the savings component, the school savings are collected weekly by the coop collector to deposit in the local cooperative (group savings in the coop but with individual passbooks in school). Savings methodology in receipts and disbursements was established to safeguard the children's money.

Aflatoun Events

We have organized Aflatoun camps in the different provinces. Some of the activities involved: creating posters on the value of saving, developing presentations on child rights, presenting a dance of the Aflatoun song and games.

Challenges

We were fortunate that our member cooperatives were willing to cover for counterpart expenses for the Aflatoun program (e.g. training expenses) and that developmental and humanitarian organizations, like Cordaid and Rabobank Foundation, funded us with the preparatory activities. Although we acknowledge the challenge of sustaining the program at the end of our funding grant, Aflatoun is definitely a program that we will see through hopefully reaching all our partner cooperatives in different island regions in the Philippines.

Aflatoun Programme

International Child Support Asia (ICS Asia) is a part of International Child Support, an international organization based in the Netherlands. We are committed to creating a world of confident boys and girls who enjoy their childhood and are able to develop and protect themselves. In this world they are free from poverty, discrimination, abuse and exploitation and they can become responsible global citizens.

Material Adaptation

The Aflatoun curriculum must be especially sensitive to local context and demands, hence, with the local Education Service Area offices (ESA) we adapted the curriculum. We have developed Aflatoun workbooks and unit plans for Grades 3 & 4, and are developing the same for Grades 5 & 6, too. We pre-tested activities with Thai children to ensure that they were relevant and enjoyable.

Training

Intensive teacher selection and training was a key factor for the programme. We have trained 12 trainers, who have reached 90 teachers. This was also done in partnership with the government (ESA) to ensure successful integration with the school system.

Stakeholders

Aside from ESA, which worked with us for material development, training and programme implementation, we are also planning to work with BAAC Bank for training purposes. Schools are already partnered with BAAC Bank in providing savings accounts for children.

Review & Reflection

Qualitative baseline work on attitudes towards child rights and savings was conducted to better understand child, teacher and parental attitudes towards child rights and financial education. Using informal semi-structured interviews with teachers and guardians, and games with children, we sought to gain a deeper understanding of these concepts in the villages as well as ways the Aflatoun programme could be made more culturally appropriate for the local situation. We found that school-based savings programmes were operating in most of the schools, but with low levels of child participation. Teachers also generally knew about the concept of child rights but did not know precisely what these rights were. Although parents were supportive of the idea of financial education in schools, there was still some misunderstanding among teachers and parents about what sources, rationale behind savings, its process and results were like. This will determine future training and implementation.

Productive Enterprises

Even before Aflatoun, the schools already had market based activities; notably gardens that furnished money for the purchase of school supplies in some schools, and garbage recycling. These still continue as it complements the Aflatoun programme.

Children's Activities

A child participation workshop was conducted in February 2009 with active participation of grade 4 from selected schools and some of our trainers. Camps on child savings and on child participation involving children from all schools will be implemented this year. Monitoring and follow-up practices will be in place to ensure that the understanding and translation of child savings and child participation take place in schools. A children's event is planned at the end of the year at which students will have a exhibition and contest of their works related to the Aflatoun programme.

Challenges

We seek to continuously improve the curriculum by conducting contextualization workshops. As we have started the pilot programme in only two grade levels, we are able to revisit the Aflatoun learning materials to see how to improve it. We have plans to pass the programme to the government and need to finalize our steps to do it.

Outreach

The focus in Europe is primarily on Commonwealth of Independent States (CIS) and CEE (Central and Eastern Europe); one of these partner organizations is live in schools (Serbia) and six are in active preparation. However, programmes are also in preparation with partners in Western Europe and at least two are expected to go live in 2009 (the Netherlands, UK).

Contextualisation

The western European/OECD model will keep the five core elements of the Aflatoun Curriculum, but will differ according to the varying economic challenges of debt availability and access to credit in the context of relative rather than absolute poverty. of the Eastern European partner organizations were formally part of Christian Children's Foundation (CCF). In one country (Kosovo) Aflatoun works with the Step by Step network, with conversations with organizations in other Eastern European countries ongoing.

Conclusions

Given the current global economic situation which has led to a decline in funding for the social sector, several partners have been forced to scale down their projections. In addition, the reduction of target projections reflect the intense work that partners and Secretariat have dedicated to developing accurate programme implementation plans, which has also led to a more realistic understanding of programming numbers. Despite this downturn in absolute scaleup numbers, the overall relative projection remains substantial.

Aflatoun Programme

We create an environment of hope and respect for children and youth, where they have opportunities to achieve their full potential, and provides children, youth, parents and communities with practical tools for positive change.

Material Adaptation

Our strategy was to translate the original material and then do a first stage contextualization to ensure its suitability for the curriculum. One important thing we did was contextualize the songs to ensure that they were songs children were familiar with. The materials are now being improved with input from the Education Ministry.

Training

Pomoc Deci trained key school staff consisting of Pedagogs, Social Workers and Head teachers in the schools, who in turn trained class teachers. The most active and interested key staff will be used in training teachers from new schools who are starting with Aflatoun. In the younger grades children have just one teacher and this teacher uses the class hour/ tutorial hour to work on Aflatoun. In the older grades the subject teachers use parts of the Aflatoun curriculum during various lessons such as Maths, English and Art.

Stakeholders

The Ministry of Education is helping to ensure that the curriculum is contextualized appropriately. We are well networked with other departments of the government and with INGO's in the country.

Review & Reflection

Responsibility is a very big issue in Serbia as there is a general perception that children can be sheltered from taking responsibility for their actions into early adulthood. Therefore, the responsibilities element of the programme is very heavily emphasized. Parents have reported children behaving more responsibly at home such as tidying their bedrooms. The children retain the Aflatoun messages very well, and this is perhaps a result of the way that Aflatoun is embedded in the curriculum of the schools.

Productive Enterprises

The children organized a fashion show using recycled clothes. They charged parents and friends of the school for attendance and were able to boost their class savings.

Aflatoun Events

In 2007 we organized a national Aflatoun event where about 30 children from each school came to an area of natural beauty in Serbia and stayed for 2 days. They took part in games, team building activities and learned more about Aflatoun. This event was a huge success despite many of the children speaking different languages and coming from different cultures. Children maintained their long distance friendships by becoming pen pals.

Challenges

Our challenge is to find funding to continue producing the children's materials. Until the programme has run for another few years, the Education Ministry will not provide official approval and, therefore, the books still need to be financed privately.



Outreach

In the MENA region, Aflatoun currently has partner organizations implementing in two countries (Egypt and Jordan), and a partner organization in a third country (Sudan) expected to go live in schools at the time of printing of this publication.

In Egypt, the Ministry is training PLAN Egypt on the implementation of the Aflatoun programme, offering a powerful example of cross-sectoral synthesis and cooperation for scale-up.

In two countries (Sudan and Yemen) Aflatoun collaborates with two partner organizations from the Education for All Network. Both organizations cooperate with INGOs, strengthening their potential outreach and sustainability of their programme (Sudan: UNICEF, PLAN and Yemen: Oxfam). They will be starting their programme using the Egyptian materials, while further developing their own contextualised set. Our Sudanese partner will provide training and guidelines to the partner in Yemen. from neighboring countries (e.g. Lebanon, Syria and the Occupied Palestinian Territories) has become available. With the two Arabic sets of materials, Aflatoun broadens its potential outreach over more countries within the Middle East.

Conclusions

Given the current global economic situation which has led to a decline in funding for the social sector, several partners have been forced to scale down their projections. In addition, the reduction of target projections reflect the intense work that partners and Secretariat have dedicated to developing accurate programme implementation plans, which has also led to a more realistic understanding of programming numbers.

Aflatoun Programme

The Ministry of Family and Population was established on the 9th of March 2009. It is the highest authority in Egypt responsible for the development of family and population issues. Four major departments form the ministry's hierarchy; the National Council for Childhood and Motherhood (NCCM), the National Council for Population (NCP), Drugs Fund for Combating and Treating Addiction and Drug Use, and the National Council for Drug Combat and Treatment.

Currently, the Ministry is putting a comprehensive work plan to meet its different objectives, previously set to meet the Egyptian society's different needs, such as; family empowerment, family planning, family justice, drug prevention and treatment, street children, child labour, girl's education, combating FGM and volunteerism, in addition to a child helpline and a drug hotline.

Material Adaptation

The Aflatoun staff in conjunction with the target group (students and trainers), have met several times to provide feedback about the development of the material including its translation and contextualization. The adaption of the material was a joint activity done by the staff, trainers and students. It was contextualized to suit the culture and also taking into consideration the most important topics and problems in society to be discussed as well as important life skills. A complete set of five books has been finalized with the fifth book compiling the adapted standards books 5, 6, 7, and 8. These books will cover approximately 1,5 hours per child in Aflatoun programme per week (approximately 60 hours per child per year).


Training

Training of trainers and teachers (as well as social workers) are organized systematically at the beginning of each academic semester on updates of the manual and programme activities. A total of 260 trainers and an additional 130 teachers are scheduled to be trained during the year 2009. The ministry has also trained Plan Egypt on the Aflatoun programme to start their own pilot project in 15 clubs in Cairo.
