"Eleven "blue men" arrived at New York's Beekman-Downtown Hospital nearly 60 years ago, on September 25, 1944. Their only obvious connection was that each had eaten oatmeal for breakfast at the Eclipse Cafeteria, so an assumption of food poisoning due to unsanitary food conditions quickly was made.

For more information about New York's mysterious 11 blue men, read Berton Roueche's "Eleven Blue Men" in The Medical Detectives, published by Time Books in 1980. Roueche's essay was originally published in The New Yorker magazine in 1947. It demonstrated how a team of epidemiologists could solve a problem of people turning blue." You will be fascinated by the story.

It is interesting now with the Internet case could have been solved much quicker using Supercourse approaches, by querying our network via email, texting or Twittering with the question of "have you ever seen blue men?"

I am sure that at least 30 of you would have responded in minutes. Then we would begin to piece together the case as we did with H1N1, where a JIT lecture would have been produced. We would of course work with you to find world experts on salt. Finally, we would go to the Environmental Health Supercourse to see what is being taught about sodium nitrate people. With the supercourse instead of one epidemiologic detective, we have 65,000.
