Faina 's Lecture of the week

We are very fortunate to have a new lecture on fluoridation from Robert J.

Weyant, DMD, Dr PH, which overviews the history of water fluoridation in the US, as well as the epidemiology of dental caries before and after water fluoridation activities. Interestingly, the incidence of caries has been increasing sharply from 1000AD to early 20th century. In 1600-1800, dental caries was one of the major causes of death. Fortunately, water fluoridation, which is one of the top 10 public health achievements identified by CDC, was able to play a major role in the reduction of dental caries and it made this disease progress more slowly.
